Mission

RCEF's mission is to increase the academic performance of underserved K-8 public school students in Redwood City.

Approach

Our goal for educational equity involves eliminating barriers to student well-being and success. We are committed to prioritizing support for three schools rich in potential and resilience. These schools serve a disproportionate number of students experiencing homelessness, foster care, language barriers, and economic hardship. While most schools within the Redwood City School District have Parent-Teacher Organizations (PTOs) that can fundraise between \$100K and \$700K annually, these schools have no PTOs to raise funds for critical unmet needs. RCEF sees a tremendous opportunity to cultivate community support and resources to meet these schools' vital needs.

Dear Friends and Supporters,

This past year, our mission was to foster a sense of belonging for every student in Redwood City by building strong partnerships with district families, community organizations, and financial supporters who share our vision. These collaborations, combined with the efforts of our dedicated staff and board, enabled us to support our three schools – Hoover, Garfield, and Taft – by providing mental health services, academic support, and enrichment opportunities to over 1,600 students.

For the first time, RCEF held two districtwide events in addition to our financial support of the schools. The RCEF Equity Summit brought together over 75 students and parents from Redwood City to connect and learn from each other. We were inspired by the students' creativity and engagement on identity and inclusion topics. And were encouraged by the support of local businesses sponsors. Our TK/Kinder Fair attracted over 100 families and showcased school leaders from across the district, allowing incoming families to learn about our campuses and community resources, including a coupon book from local businesses!

We are grateful to the Redwood City Rotary Club, which created an incredible Wine Walk event that engaged over 20 downtown businesses and drew over 300 people

to support RCEF! We are also thankful for establishing RCEF's inaugural Advisory Board, which has enlisted subject matter experts from various fields to offer strategic input and guidance, fostering a sense of community and encouraging continued engagement.

As we start the new school year, we thank Sara Alexander for her exceptional leadership as Executive Director over the past two years. Her dedication has driven our initiatives and led to lasting positive impact. As she transitions to a new role as a full-time mental health counselor in the community, she will continue to serve on our Advisory Board, enriching our investment in our students.

This year, for the first time since 2019, we've outlined a vision for supporting students with the greatest needs across all our schools. We're excited to share our expansion plans for 2024-2025 and beyond, showing the potential for significant achievements in the future.

SUPPORT FOR TARGET SCHOOLS

RCEF uses an equity-based approach to grantmaking, empowering families and school leaders to shape funding priorities. We cultivate programs based on each school's unique needs, aligning them with RCEF's priorities of nurturing students' holistic well-being and fostering personal and academic success.

Student Wellness

Bilingual Mental Health Counseling with One Life Counseling

In its fourth year, this initiative provided crucial support by offering bilingual therapy in schools and breaking down barriers related to transportation, financial constraints, and linguistic differences. The program promoted social-emotional awareness, facilitated prevention and intervention programs, and maintained regular communication between schools and families to create a more inclusive and supportive environment for all students.

Behavioral Specialist & Positive School Culture

RCEF funded a Behavioral Specialist at Hoover School to help maintain a safe student environment. Ms. Nally, a certified special education teacher, worked directly with 25 students in 6 high-need classrooms, helping the students overcome challenging behaviors and mental health needs.

"When working with Ms. Nally, she will help me identify what is going on for me. Sometimes, she will help me figure out what is wrong and what is stopping me from doing my work. She is supportive." - 7th Grade Student, Hoover Community School

Ms. Nally collaborated with counselors and Hoover's leadership team to enhance the implementation of the Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) curriculum. She oversaw the weekly Husky Mart, where students traded Golden Paw Tickets for incentive items.

"The Husky Golden Paw Awards have been an invaluable tool in affirming student behavior that aligns with our school's core values of being safe, respectful, and responsible."

The Husky Chill Zone, introduced in September 2024, also provided students with a safe space to relax and manage their emotions. Since its launch, the Chill Zone has had 150 student visits, with students typically spending 10-15 minutes there before returning to class. 90% of students reported feeling better after using the Chill Zone.

"I like that the Chill Zone is stress-free. If I'm down, I go there to take a break, and then I feel motivated to go back to class."

The combined efforts have significantly improved students' emotional regulation, participation in school activities, and sense of community. The Husky Mart and Golden Paw Tickets have promoted positive behavior and student responsibility. Ms. Nally's SEL initiatives have enhanced social-emotional skills, promoting a more peaceful school environment and supporting academic success.

Academic Support

Math & English Language Academies with **College Advising Prep**

While the program was intended to increase math literacy, number skills, and problem-solving skills for students who are 2-3 years below grade level in math, the program has developed a great reputation that many students proactively reached out to the community school coordinator, teachers, and the principal requesting to be added to a Reading or Math Academy group. Students saw that when they ask for help, they get it, as the program expanded to include all students interested in receiving support. After 6-10 months of participation in the College Advising Preparatory (CAP) learning academies, students exhibited at least one year's grade-level growth in their academic skills.

"We are seeing students who couldn't read at the start of their time with us now being able to put together sounds and form sentences. They can read longer words. One student didn't know his numbers when we started with him two years ago, and now he is doing multiplication problems and arrays and fractions. Even third graders are doing more complicated three-digit by one-digit multiplication. It's incredible to see how much they've grown."

Phonics and Language Curriculum

Phonics is crucial for children as it lays the foundation for effective reading and spelling. This Garfield School program aimed to improve student literacy and reading skills using phonics-based reading materials from FlyLeaf Publishing. These books provided systematic support and are aligned with the California Reading & Literature Project (CRLP) system, focusing on various phonics patterns and multisyllabic words for grades K-5. Teachers used these books for targeted small-group instruction and independent reading sessions, allowing students to practice reading and decoding skills.

Literacy Retention with Project READ

This program supported Garfield 4th-5th graders who were 1-2 years below grade level in reading comprehension and vocabulary. It provided a fun environment for practicing reading skills with tutors from the Redwood City Public Library, leading to all students advancing in reading levels. The program promoted a love for reading and helped students develop confidence, contributing to their academic success and personal growth.

"We start our sessions by reviewing the basic math skills with card games or multiplication bingo [which] helped my student visualize homework problems, especially when adding fractions and calculating the volume of a box. My favorite part of working with my student is seeing her face light up when she



Reading Intervention Specialist

70% of students who received support advanced one level in their reading skills. The bilingual reading intervention specialist at Taft School supported 1st-5th graders needing extra help with reading. Over the 2023-24 school year, this teacher conducted more than 100, 30-minute sessions. Many parents appreciated the positive growth and requested that their children continue participating. The school promoted reading in parent newsletters and provided books for summer reading.

Community Tutoring with Healthy Cities Tutoring

Healthy Cities Tutoring brought community tutors to Taft School to improve academic success, increase engagement, and boost self-esteem for students. 12 teens from Boys & Girls' Club of the Peninsula Keystone Club, Menlo School, and Girls Middle School trained to tutor students, focusing on helping them become proficient in English. The sessions included interactive aloud, partner reading, English Language Development (ELD) activities, and group games. The community tutors supported English learners, fostering a sense of belonging and creating meaningful connections, enhancing academic performance, and promoting active participation in the classroom.

Thriving Communities

Back-to-School Supplies

During the Maze Days kickoff to the 2023-2024 school year, Hoover students eagerly received backpacks filled with essential school supplies. This annual event sets the tone for a successful academic year. It fosters community and preparedness among students as they embark on their educational journey at Hoover School.

Family Partnership Activities

For RCEF and Garfield School, our families are a vital part of the community, and families must see themselves as partners with the schools in their children's education and development. Through various engagement strategies, parent participation at the School Site Council (SSC), English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC), and Cafecito has grown over the last three years. Parents welcome and look forward to being involved in their children's education.

The goal of family partnership activities was to build literacy and math skills, explore visual and performing arts, and promote family learning. Garfield's Literacy Night included a literacy presentation, read-aloud sessions, guidelines for student comprehension, a book overview, and student engagement activities with prizes. 470 Garfield students in TK-8th grade received Scholastic bilingual book kits, totaling 3,760 books distributed. The event was well received, demonstrating the community's interest in more events with take-home resources and practical strategies for families.

ADVOCACY & COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

RCEF is dedicated to fostering belonging through community action. This year, we have focused on breaking down divisions and promoting a unified community in Redwood City. We aim to strengthen our schools and empower the community by celebrating diversity and removing barriers to opportunities.

RCEF Equity Summit

A Family Discussion on Diverse Identities and Inclusive Communities

The annual RCEF Equity Summit raises awareness about educational equity and inspires actionable steps toward making a difference. This March, we brought together students and families from all the RCSD schools for a day of reflection and action at the CZI Community Space. Participants engaged in bilingual discussions and diverse activities to foster community strength. There were sensory rooms and activities for all abilities to ensure inclusivity. We extend heartfelt thanks to our generous donors who supported this event.

Parent attendees unanimously desired more district-wide family events, with 70% gaining new insights about their children. Among students, 91% enjoyed and fully participated in the activities, with 96% valuing the opportunity to learn from and connect with peers from different backgrounds. The summit highlighted the importance of creating welcoming environments for all, reflecting our commitment to nurturing inclusive communities where everyone feels valued and respected.

Wine Walk

In partnership with the Rotary Club of Redwood City, we proudly hosted our inaugural Wine Walk, garnering over 300 participants for an evening of community, friendship, and support for education. Held in downtown Redwood City, the event featured local cuisine paired with exquisite wines from 18 participating businesses, creating a vibrant atmosphere filled with laughter and camaraderie.

Participants enjoyed reconnecting with old friends and making new acquaintances, all while supporting RCEF's mission to enhance educational opportunities for our students. The Wine Walk celebrated our community's spirit and diversity and raised critical awareness and funds for our educational initiatives. It exemplified our shared belief in the transformative power of education and the strength of community support.

We extend our deepest gratitude to all participants, donors, and sponsors whose generosity and enthusiasm made the Wine Walk a resounding success. Your support enables us to continue fostering educational excellence and building a thriving community in Redwood City.

TK/Kinder Resource Fair

The first TK/Kinder Resource Fair in May aimed to introduce parents to the district and RCEF. During the two afternoon sessions, over 100 future RCSD parents gathered to meet each other, ask questions of their prospective school principals and PTO leaders, and learn about RCEF's collaborative efforts with the City and School District.

Attendees also received informational packets and a coupon booklet featuring many Redwood City businesses and recreational opportunities. We sincerely appreciate the local businesses who generously contributed coupons for the booklet. The fair highlighted our commitment to creating an inclusive community where all students can thrive and all families feel welcome and supported.

Community Presence

We collaborate with school leaders through initiatives including Cafecitos (Coffee with the Principals), the English Learner Advisory Committee, and the School Site Council. Additionally, we support community events such as the Winter Kermes, Literacy Night, and Day of the Child. RCEF is an active member of the North Fair Oaks/Redwood City Community Collaboration for Children's Success (CCCS) Neighborhood Action Team, prioritizing equity and inclusivity for all residents.

Collaborative Alliances

We sincerely appreciate the organizations that supported RCEF this year in advancing our mission to foster equitable learning environments in Redwood City.

We thank **Emerald Lake Country Club** for supporting our auction, which benefits our schools and underscores their commitment to fostering a sense of belonging among members and the local community.




